

Book Review

The Land of Odds: Parenting the Teen Tornado By Linda Sirridge

Wanting a book on parenting with concrete information about the middle school environment--the challenges and triumphs in a typical school day of a 5th through 8th grader? You are in luck! Parents of middle schoolers now have a new resource available to them, The Land of Odds: Parenting the Teen Tornado, a conversational and user friendly book. The authors, Linda and Steve Sirridge and Jean Kasselman, combine the experience of a teacher, psychologist, and elementary principal.

The Land of Odds provides a peek into the emotional and social changes of the 11-14-year-old adolescent. The book weaves the themes from the Wizard of Oz throughout the text, especially highlighting the similarities of Dorothy's journey with the transitions that

all young teens must pass through.

Particularly intriguing is the format of the book. The book is broken into nine chapters and is under one hundred pages in length. This format is easy for parents to finish reading in one sitting or leisurely browse one chapter at a time. Each author has an icon which designates when he/she is speaking throughout the chapter.

You will find this mixture of "voices" engaging as each professional offers a unique perspective. Linda brings her experience as a middle school teacher and counselor while Jean loans her insights as an administrator, and Steve offers his expertise as a psychologist and university professor.

The Land of Odds emphasizes certain themes

such as reinforcing the teen to become more of a problem solver and self advocate, establishing realistic boundaries, and looking at typical vs. nontypical behaviors. The authors also invite parents to continue to offer unconditional love, together with clear boundary setting and age appropriate expectations.

Particular attention is directed toward maintaining the child-parent relationship (the primary motivation and goal) even as these teens distance, rebel, and diminish a parent's importance. 
